

# REPORT OF THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE NATIONAL INSTITUTE OF PUBLIC FINANCE AND POLICY FOR THE FINANCIAL YEAR 1979-80

### Introduction

The year 1979-80 is the fourth year of operation of the Institute. During this year, the Institute made considerable progress in its research programmes and consultancy services. In continuation of the training programmes which were started in the previous year, two workshops and one advanced training course were conducted during this year.

As on March 31, 1980, the Institute had on its rolls 17 professional staff members including the Director. In addition, there were four temporary Research Investigators attached to various projects. The list of faculty members other than temporary Research Investigators is given in Annexure I. During the year three of our staff members, namely, Dr. M. C. Purohit, Fellow, Dr. Shyam Nath, Senior Economist and Shri P. K. Aggarwal, Economist were sent to different Universities in the U. S. A. under the Ford Foundation Grant for specialised training in the field of public finance. They are receiving advanced training at the Universities of California (Berkeley), Syracuse and Harvard, respectively. After completion of training they would be returning at different times during the year 1980-81.\*

In the annual report for the year 1978-79 it had been mentioned that Dr. A. Bagchi, Director, Fiscal Policy Section, Ministry of Finance, had been offered the RBI chair in the Institute and that he was expected to join duty sometime in September 1979. However, owing to exigencies of official work and other causes, Dr. Bagchi could not join us during the year. In consultation with the Chairman, he was permitted to join duty by the end of May 1980.\*\* Our professional staff on the direct taxes side was strengthened by the appointment in June 1979 of Shri K. Srinivasan, formerly a Member of the Central Board of Direct Taxes, as Senior Consultant. Shri J. S. Kapoor who came to us on deputation from the Income Tax Department continues to work with us as Senior Tax Analyst.

### Research Activities

It had been stated in the annual report for the year 1978-79 that the World Bank had sponsored a project on the measurement of comparative tax effort by the Indian States.

This project which covered 15 States and all the major taxes levied by them and which made use of the Representative Tax System Approach, was completed during the current year. The World Bank approved of the report and gave permission to the Institute to publish it.

Another project started during the previous year, namely "The Growth and Composition of Central Government Expenditure", was submitted to the Planning Commission for sponsorship. The Planning Commission, while agreeing to sponsor the project, desired that the composition of government expenditure of at least one of the State governments should also be taken up for study. This was agreed to and Gujarat state was selected for the case study. We are glad to report that we have received the co-operation of the office of the Directorate General of Supply and Disposal, who have made available some useful data on the commodity composition of the Central Government expenditure.

A project on Resource Mobilisation in the Private Corporate Sector was sponsored by the Associated Chambers of Commerce and Industry of India in June 1979. The objective of the study was to identify the major trends in resource mobilisation by the private corporate sector and to examine the impact of major Governmental policies on the growth and composition of the resources mobilised. For this purpose, 15 - year data for a sample of 99 manufacturing companies in the private corporate sector were specially collected. On the basis of these data an attempt was made, employing econometric techniques, to measure the impact of selected fiscal and monetary instruments of policy. The study was completed by the end of March, 1980. The titles of projects already completed, on going projects and projects proposed to be undertaken by the Institute are given in Annexure II.


# Work for the State Governments

As during the previous year, during the current year also, the staff of the Institute have been fairly busy with the assignments on behalf of State Governments. It was mentioned in the report for the year 1978-79 that a draft report on the Rationalisation of the Sales Tax System in Bihar had been submitted to the Commissioner of Commercial Taxes in that State. In the light of the comments received, the final report was submitted during the current year. The Government of Bihar have given us permission to publish the report.

The Institute continued to do background research work in connection with the studies undertaken by the Gujarat Taxation Enquiry Commission and the Uttar Pradesh Taxation Enquiry Committee which had been set up under the Chairmanship of the Director of the Institute, Dr. R. J. Chelliah. Among the important pieces of work undertaken on behalf of the Gujarat Taxation Enquiry Commission may be mentioned a detailed study on 'Incidence of State Taxes in Gujarat'.

# Training Programmes

The Institute had conducted a workshop for State government officials on the 'Techniques of Budgetary Projections' in February 1979 under the sponsorship of the Department of

Personnel and Administrative Reforms, Ministry of Home Affairs. At their request, a second workshop on the Techniques of Budgetary Projections was held in Bangalore in 1979 for the officials of the Western and Southern States. Besides, at the request of the State Planning Institute, Government of Uttar Pradesh, a workshop on the same subject was held in Lucknow in January 1980 for the officials of the State Government.

The Institute made a new beginning in imparting training to tax officials by conducting an Advanced Course in Sales Tax Administration in India for officials of the State governments in the Eastern Zone. This course was conducted at the instance of the Eastern Zonal Council for Excises and Sales Taxes and the Department of Revenue, Ministry of Finance. As many as 19 officials attended the course which was held from October 29 to November 19, 1979.

# Visiting Professors

Professor I. S. Gulati continues to be a visiting professor to the Institute. He visited the Institute twice during the year and participated in our research activities. An important step towards regional co-operation was taken with the arrival of Prof. Taherul Islam, Head of the Department of Economics, University of Dacca, Bangladesh, as a visiting professor under a fellowship given by ADIPA. (The fellowship money was derived by ADIPA from U. N. sources.) Professor T. Islam stayed with us for three months from the beginning of March 1980. During his stay he conducted two seminars and prepared a paper on the Remittance Scheme in Bangladesh, which would soon be brought out as a working paper of the Institute.

# Exchange of Scholars and Collaborative Research

Dr. Larry Schroeder, Associate Professor, Syracuse University, U. S. A., came to the Institute as a visiting scholar to conduct collaborative research on 'Urban Property Taxation.' He stayed with us for about three weeks in May 1979. Professor S. P. Gupta of Sambalpur University, a specialist in public finance, came to the Institute for a month in June 1979 as a visiting professor and worked with our staff members on 'Techniques of Forecasting Government Expenditure'. The expenses connected with the visits of these two scholars were financed out of the Ford Foundation grant earmarked for collaborative research.

### Seminars

The programme of seminars given by visiting scholars and the Institute's own staff was continued. The details of the regular seminars conducted during the year are presented in Annexure III. One of the highlights of the programme during the year was the seminar given on 'Fiscal Equalisation in Australia' by Dr. R. L. Mathews, Director, Centre for Research on Federal Financial Relations, Australian National University, Canberra, in September 1979. Prof. T. Islam gave two seminars, the details of which are given in the Annexure.

# Computer

In the year 1977, the Institute had acquired Microsystem 1121 from DCM Data Products. While that machine could be used for running regressions, it was quite inefficient in that it had no memory and the data had to be punched in repeatedly. With the increase in work that the Institute had to undertake for the Central Government Departments and the State governments, it was found necessary to acquire a small computer. After discussions with the Deputy Director of the Government Computer Centre in New Delhi and with the approval of the Finance Sub-Committee, a mini computer manufactured by DCM Data Products, namely, SPECTRUM 7 was acquired in July 1979. This computer is very efficient and enables us not merely to carry out various kinds of statistical manipulations but also to store public finance data. The computer system that we have acquired is capable of being expanded for greater manoeuvrability and for larger storage capacity.

# Library

During the year nearly 1000 volume of books, reports and other publications were added to the holdings of the Library. As of now, 73 periodicals including, loose leaf series are being received. The list of journals received in the library is given in Annexure IV. Persistent efforts are being made to maintain and expand our activities in getting books from prominent institutions from abroad. Our total holdings of books and reports now amount to 3000 volumes.

During the year, a photocopying machine was acquired and installed in the library. This machine is mainly used for copying articles and documents needed for research projects.

# Lectures by Staff Members

Several of our faculty members were invited to give lectures at seminars and courses organised by other Institutions. Among them may be mentioned the Institute of Secretariat Training and Management, Department of Personnel, Ministry of Home Affairs, the Management Development Institute, Delhi, National Defence College, Delhi, the Delhi Management Association and M. S. University, Baroda. Details about the lectures given are presented in Annexure V.

# Publication of Articles by Individual Staff Members

During the year, several staff members contributed articles and research papers to journals and newspapers. Some working papers were also prepared. A list of papers and articles brought out during the year is given in Annexure VI.

Dr. R. J. Chelliah submitted a paper on Planning and Fiscal Federalism in India to an Indo-Soviet Seminar held in Moscow sometime in May 1979. He submitted another paper on 'Fiscal Policy and Regional Disparities in India' to a seminar on the subject held under

the auspices of International Seminar in Public Economics, in Toledo, Spain in September 1979.

# **ADIPA Project**

The Institute is a member of the regional research association called ADIPA (Association of Development Research and Training Institutes of Asia and the Pacific). The Director of the Institute attended the fourth Biennial Conference of ADIPA held in Seoul in October 1979. At this seminar various research projects on which the several institutes could collaborate was discussed. On behalf of the Institute, the Director proposed a project on 'Resource Mobilisation through the Tax System - a Study of Asian Experience'. We are glad to report that our Institute was chosen as the lead Institute and was asked to organise the entire project. Eight countries in the region, besides India, namely, Bangladesh, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Japan, Nepal, Philippines, South Korea and Sri Lanka are participating in the project, Representative of participating institutions from these countries, (excluding Japan) attended a project development meeting in April 1980. At this meeting, a common framework of study and analysis for the project was developed. The project will gather speed after sufficient funds are obtained.

# Corporate Membership

During the year, one more nationalised bank, namely, Bank of Baroda, became an ordinary corporate member. As on 31-3-1980, the Institute has 15 Sponsoring Corporate, 5 Life Corporate and 19 Oridnary members. Efforts will now be made to enlist major Municipal Corporations as our Corporate members. The list of members is given in Annexure VII.

# Composition of the Governing Body

Certain changes have taken place in the composition of the Governing Body during the year. Shri S. S. Puri became an ex-officio member on our Governing Body after taking over charge from Shri Ajit Mzoomdar, as Secretary, Planning Commission. Shri Hari Shankar Singhania, represented the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry and Shri A. L. Mudaliar, represented the Associated Chambers of Commerce and Industry of India on the Governing Body. A list of the Governing Body Members as on 31 March 1980 is given in Annexure VIII.

# **Building for the Institute**

The concept plans for the Institute's building as prepared by the Architect were approved by the Building Committee at its meeting held on August 30, 1979. The Architect submitted the Plan for the Institute's building to the Delhi Development Authority for their approval. We are happy to report that the plans have since been approved by the Delhi Development Authority and the Urban Arts Commission. The DDA has also allowed the Institute to cover upto 25 per cent of FAR for residential purposes. At present, the Architect

and our Project Consultant (Engineer) are in the process of finalising the tender documents for calling tenders. The construction work is expected to begin shortly.

The construction of the building complex of the Institute is likely to cost around Rs. 43 lakh. The capital grant from the Government of India, assistance from the Ford Foundation and the drawing down of the Endowment Fund would together give us an amount of Rs. 25 lakh. In order to raise the rest of the money, the Director of the Institute has addressed letters to the major State Governments requesting them to contribute Rs. 1 lakh each to our Building Fund. Other members have also been requested to contribute to the building fund.

We are glad to inform that the governments of Andhra Pradesh, Gujarat, Uttar Pradesh, and West Bengal have already agreed in principle to contribute Rs. 1 lakh each to our building fund.

# **Endowment Fund**

During the year, no fresh contribution was received towards the Endowment Fund. On April 1, 1979, the Endowment Fund stood at Rs. 46,50,000. During the current year, an amount of Rs. 1,50,000 which had been drawn down from the Endowment Fund to meet the short-fall in money needed to purchase the land allotted to the Institute was transferred back to the Endowment Fund after the receipt of the Ford Foundation funds. After this transfer, the Endowment Fund was restored to the original level of Rs. 48,00,000.

During the year, a sum of Rs. 24,250 was received from the Associated Chambers of Commerce and Industry of India, through its various members, thereby raising its contribution to Rs. 4,90,000 against the total promised contribution of Rs. 5,00,000. This amount has been placed separately in the Scientific Research Fund.

# Ford Foundation Grant

During the year, out of the total non-recurring grant of U. S. \$ 2,00,000 sanctioned by the Ford Foundation, the Institute obtained release of the following amounts.
